23	Which composer (1548-1611) was next to Francisco Guerrero and Cristóbal de Morales, the most significant Spanish Renaissance composer, and is often called "the Spanish Palestrina"? He wrote numerous sacred vocal works, and his requiem for six voices, "Officium Defunctorum" (released 1603), composed for the funeral of the Dowager Empress Maria, is especially well known.

The epic has a title which means "Book of Kings" and the main hero of the epic is Rostam, son of Zal and Rudabeh. Consisting of some 60,000 verses it is the world's longest epic poem written by a single poet.
